

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- Identify how fees will be determined for programs and activities.
- National Parks and Recreation Association best practices standard core services model.
- As individual or more enterprise benefit is provided, then the higher the cost recovery.
- Two Overall Goals:
  - 1. Maximize use of facilities
  - 2. Increase programming to provide more community benefit.



# **Levels of Benefit**

• **Mostly Community Benefit** — The foundation, programs and facilities which MOSTLY benefit the COMMUNITY as a whole. These programs, facilities and services can increase property values, provide safety, address social needs and enhance the quality of life for residents. Use is non-exclusive and on an informal basis.

Ex: Parks, playgrounds, skateparks.

• **Considerable Community Benefit** – Programs, facilities and services that provide recreational skill developmental and promote individual physical and mental well-being primarily in a group setting, Generally benefits the community more than the individual. Ex: beginning level programs, batting cages, fishing, some special events

• Enhanced – Individual/Community Benefit – Services that promote individual physical and mental well-being, and provides beginner and intermediate level of recreational skill development. Equivalent benefit to the individual and community.

Ex: summer sports leagues, recreational leagues, swim lessons, camps.

• **Specialized – Mostly Individual Benefit** – Specialized services generally for specific individuals and groups, and may have a competitive focus. Primary benefit to the individual, little community benefit.

Ex: adult sports leagues, golf, private swim lessons.

• Enterprise – Highly Individual Benefit – Activities that have a profit center potential and may even fall outside the core mission. Programs that compete in the open market: specific uses based on an expressed demand and willingness to pay; use is exclusive; competitive skill levels.

Ex: pavilion and other facility rentals for private/exclusive use, private golf lessons.

# **Example: Enhanced- Individual Community Benefit (50%)**

**Community Special Event Entry -** Entry fees for special community events, or other periodic events are based on event's expenses and expected number of participants.

**Car Show/Entertainment (on-site)** - Total cost for the program staff, contracted service, supplies, equipment, plus a 50% factor to recover program coordinator costs, divided by the projected number of participants.

#### EXAMPLE (Car Show)

Staff	\$192
Trophies	\$175
Entertainment	\$500
T-shirts	\$500
Portable restrooms	<u>\$320</u>
	$1687 \times 150\% = 2.530/100 \text{ participants} = 25/\text{participant}$

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### **Example:** Considerable Community/Individual Benefit (25%)

Leisure Interest Classes or Workshops - Total cost for the program staff, instructor, supplies, equipment, plus a 25% factor to recover program coordinator costs, divided by the number of expected registrations. Note: Senior discounts may apply to this category.

#### **EXAMPLE**

Instructor \$12/hour x 3 times per week for 4 weeks =	\$144
Class supplies	\$ <u>25</u>
	\$169 x 125% = \$211/10 registrations = \$21/participant

**Aquatics-Class** - Learn-to-Swim, Water Aerobics, Water Safety Instructor, Lifeguard Training. Total cost for the program staff, lifeguard, instructor, supplies and equipment, plus a 25% factor to recover program coordinator costs, divided by the minimum number of expected registrations. Red Cross fees are also added to the per person registration fee.

#### **Sports - Youth Leagues -** Recreational programs for youth ages 8 – 17.

Total cost for the program staff, instructor, officials, supplies, and equipment plus a 25% factor to recover program coordinator costs, divided by the minimum number of expected registrations.

#### EXAMPLE: Girl's Softball Tournament

Officials	\$1450
Staff	\$2000
Awards	\$ 500
Equipment	<u>\$ 500</u>
	4450 divided by 40 teams = 111 x 125% = 139/per team

### **Example:** Between Mostly and Considerable Community Benefit (0%)

### Youth Enrichment (non-sport) Activity or Program -

Total cost for the program staff, instructor, supplies and equipment divided by the minimum number of expected registrations.

Youth - "Character & Skills"- Developmental and instructional programs for children ages 4-7.

EXAMPLE: T-Ball	
Equipment	\$2000
T-shirts and Caps	\$ 770
Awards (trophies)	\$ 577
Volunteer coach background checks	\$ 560
Staff	<u>\$ 675</u>
	\$4582 divided by 155 participants = \$30/participant
