CERTIFICATES OF OBLIGATION



- What action can the Court take today
- What happens during the Petition Verification process
- What can the Court do once the petition is confirmed valid or is not valid

PETITION REQUIREMENTS



- Must contain signatures of at least 5% of "qualified voters"
 - "Qualified voter" means "registered voter" or person whose registration is effective at the time of signature
- Must be received by the County Clerk by September 12th

SIGNATURE REQUIREMENTS



- Must be in signer's handwriting; i.e. "wet" signature
 - Signature need not be legible
- In addition to:
 - Printed Name
 - DOB or Voter Registration Number
 - Residence address
 - Date of signature
 - Must comply with any other applicable law

VERIFICATION PROCESS



- Develop reasonable process/timeframe by which to verify
- One "bad" signature does not invalidate the petition
- Petition signature is invalid if an individual signed 180 days before the date the petition is received

Cannot approve COs today
